### Bethany Lutheran Health Services Auxiliary President Duties: As OUTLINED IN BLHS BY-LAWS

Article I. Duties of officers: It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and to perform all other duties pertaining to the office. The President shall be an ex-officio member of all committees. (Currently we have none.) The President shall appoint all standing and special committees (currently we have none), with the approval of an Administrator of Bethany Lutheran Health Services and the Executive Board of the Auxiliary. The term is for two years beginning January 9<sup>th</sup>.

### Did You Know

FROM ON THE FREEDOM OF A CHRISTIAN BY REV. TRAVIS LOESLIE

Martin Luther had much to say on the topic of Christian freedom in his tract from 1520. *On* 

the Freedom of the Christian was published in Wittenberg as the third of three writings that characterized the evangelical theology of the Reformation. The Roman Curia had issued the bull Exsurge Domine on June 15, 1520 in which Luther was threatened to be charged as a heretic and ordered to halt his preaching. This opened him up to the possibility of arrest and punishment. Luther responded with a fury of activity. To the Christian Nobility of the German Nation was published on August 18, 1520. The Babylonian Captivity of the Church was published on October 6, and On the Freedom of the Christian was put out early in November of 1520. This third tract was written to attempt to persuade Pope Leo X and Roman Catholics that the theology of the Reformation was not a novelty in the faith, but a pure confession of the Word of God and consistent with the truth of the Holy Scriptures. Out of this affliction and the Lord's refining fire, Luther was given to write one of the most enduring treatments on Christian freedom ever in Christendom.

- A Christian is an utterly free man, lord of all, subject to none.
- A Christian is an utterly dutiful man, servant of all, subject to all.

Luther's tract on freedom has rightly been called: "the most perfect expression of Luther's Reformation understanding of the mystery of Christ." As it goes with Christ, so it goes with the freedom of the Christian. The Freedom of the Christian is a confession of Christ in a nutshell. Christian freedom is a gift from Christ Himself, "For freedom Christ has set us free..." (Galatians 5:1). What Christ did to win salvation in His divine and human natures. He now gives to those who by baptism bear His name: Christian. God justifies the sinner by faith alone. The sinner is changed in inner and outer man after the likeness of Christ. The Christian is at once utterly free in faith and a servant to all in works of love. Christian life is lived between these twin poles of faith and love. This is the paradoxical Christian freedom as Luther taught the Church.

### Council Minutes for 08/15/2022

Member absent: Connie Edson, Shelby Rickard, Alan Ellis

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by President Mike Winter. Mike Winter gave a prayer.

Secretary's minutes from the July meeting: Motion to approve by Mike Loos, seconded by Mike Hipnar. Motion carried.

Financial Secretary report: Motion to approve by Char Les Kemmish, seconded by Nick Rickard. Motion carried.

Treasurer's report: Motion to approve by Chris Reed, seconded by Mike Hipnar. Motion carried.

Capital Fund report: Motion to approve by Chris Reed, seconded by Greg Steensland. Motion carried.

Memorial Fund report: Motion to approve by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Char Les Kemmish. Motion carried.

Rick Stone and Richard Reed from the Finance Committee attended the meeting.

As of last week, the current budget shows a deficit of only \$6k+ now (instead of \$30k+).

Transfer the following accounts to general budget: Library Funds, Church Council Funds, Mission Support Fund, Wednesday Night Dinner Fund and Fresh Start Team Program Account Fund. Motion to approve by Greg Steensland, seconded by Nick Rickard. Motion carried.

The Finance Committee is recommending to transfer monies from Memorial Funds, Day Care Start Up and Miller Estate to a variety of CDs with Veridian Credit Union to earn interest up to a rate of 3.10%. Motion to approve by Chris Reed, seconded by Greg Steensland. Motion carried. UPDATE after council meeting: A total of \$278,140 in 5 different CD's at Veridian, 12-30 months CD, Rate from 2.50% to 3.10%.

Pastor Cara presented her monthly report.

- Matt and Janet Perrone wish to transfer their membership from Rejoice Lutheran to us. Motion to approve by Mike Loos, seconded by Chris Reed. Motion carried.
- The thermostat upstairs doesn't seem to be working properly. The temperature has been over 80 this week. Property committee will look into.

- Immanuel Vision Foundation Grant Application has a grant for up to \$10,000, the cutoff for application is September 30. The following items were discussed: Hoover Elementary School, North Broadway Neighborhood Association, and shelter at church for us and community use.
- Pastor Cara has a new ministry idea...at the rummage sale a member of the community offered up to \$1,000 for outreach ministry. What Pastor is proposing is starting a writing group called Healing Through Writing to help promote increased mental health. There is also \$2,240.15 in the Mental Health Fund. Motion to approve Healing Through Writing ministry by Nick Rickard, seconded by Mike Winter. Motion carried.
- Fall Convention is September 25-27 at Lutheran Lakeside Camp. Rostered leaders are expected to attend. Cost is \$165 for registration and meals, plus \$30 a night for lodging. Motion to approve \$225 from the Seminar & Training budget by Mike Hipnar, seconded by Chris Reed. Motion carried.

Committee Reports:

- Property: Char Les Kemmish reported that the Facet was fixed for \$600. She also got a quote from Able Locksmith to replace 2 double doors and 1 single door (12 keys included) for an estimate of \$562.50. Motion to "take no action" by Nick Rickard, seconded by Mike Loos. Motion carried. Michaela Lewis brought to the council attention that the church answering machine was not changed when Pastor Cara was on vacation, Pastor does not want her personal cell phone on the church voice message for emergencies. The council agreed with this decision.
